

Planned elements of the sesquicentennial celebration may include a special weekend of festivities in late July. There is no more important mission at the Volusia Sheriff's Office than the safety and security of our schools.

Across the Volusia County School District, our school resource deputies, officers, and armed guardians are working every day to protect everyone on campus.

My job is to provide every tool that could help save lives. That's why I am so proud that Volusia County has been selected as one of only 3 school districts in Florida to participate in a groundbreaking pilot program with "Campus Guardian Angel," a Texas company pioneering the use of drone technology to help law enforcement save lives during the worst-case scenario of an active shooter attack.

The Campus Guardian Angel system deploys non-lethal drones within seconds of an emergency alert, providing real-time video to law enforcement and using deterrents such as sirens, flashing lights, and pepper spray pellets to disorient a potential attacker.

The drones are flown remotely by elite pilots, but they're stored securely on-site and can reach any point on campus in as little as 15 seconds. The idea is that this immediate response can buy critical time for first responders, potentially saving lives.

This pilot program will begin implementation this year, with Campus Guardian Angel working closely with us and Volusia County Schools to integrate the system into existing safety protocols.


Ultimately, the results of this pilot will help determine whether the technology is expanded statewide. The Florida Legislature allocated \$557,000 to fund this initial evaluation.

It's a major credit to the leadership of Superintendent Dr. Carmen Balgobin and our School Safety and Security Director, VSO Capt. Todd Smith. We have proven ourselves as a forward-thinking team that will always embrace emerging technology in the pursuit of a safer community.

A NATIVE REMEMBERS

As I begin my 77th trip around the sun I can't help but think how blessed I am to have spent most of those trips right here along this beautiful piece of the earth. Not to mention the blessings of being born in the latter part of the 20th century. Considering some of the other options that have been available to most of mankind, say like, central Europe during mid 1300s as the bubonic plague raged, or maybe being one Noah's neighbors as it started to sprinkle....no pretty darn lucky, I'd say.

I spent my first 10 orbits during the 1950s. The America I grew up in would be hardly recognizable to kids today. There was some good stuff back then that we discarded, and there was some bad stuff that needed to be discarded. But that seems to be the case in mankind's evolution. I think in some instances we threw the baby out with the bath water. Almost all my friends had both a mother and a father in their homes, and community parenting seemed to be the norm. We all respected and followed adult instructions whether the instructing adult was our parent or not. It seemed that all parents were members in some sort of PBI...Parent's Bureau of Investigation...it was hard to get away with anything that was deemed unacceptable behavior.

I grew up in a middle-class family. For most of my childhood my mom was a stay-at-home mom, we even had what we called back then a maid, Bertha. Bertha was an African American and came to the house 2 or 3 times a week to help my mom do housework. Bertha had the same authority as my mom when it came to use kids and the household rules...I can remember more than once leaving the house bare footed and having Bertha hollering at me to get back home and put shoes on my feet. And you better believe I got home and put shoes on my feet. But as we all



know, the segregation at that time was one of those things that gratefully, we discarded.

I had a Huck Finn childhood, growing up in what would be considered country now, dirt roads, cattle farms, orange groves, fishing in the river, and lots of woods. I wandered those woods, built forts, and camped with the other neighborhood kids from the time I was 6 years old. I started working at 11 when delivered papers for the News Journal (two papers back then, Morning Journal and the Evening News) pedaling my Schwinn with its wide tires through the soft sand of most of the roads throwing papers. City Island back then had 2 beautifully manicured Little Diamonds, and the bleachers were always full with moms and dads who came to watch the games.

The Atlantic Ocean beach was a magnet for most of us in our teen-age years, and working as life guard was a plum job. Most of my friends worked either as lifeguards on the beach, or like me, worked as pool guards on the decks of the motels. Any attempt to describe the feelings of joy and excitement that came from that time would take poet. But here is a little piece of what I can recall. The tourists were in awe, and we knew it. That awe instilled a sense of pride in us, a pride in Daytona Beach, and that kindled for me the first awareness of what a blessing it is to be living here.

Sure, as a community we have missed the mark in some instances to recognize, and use our blessings in the best way possible. Humans do human things. Still, there is so much of the beauty that existed in my childhood that remains and

could be saved. They say that negativity cannot exist in an attitude of gratitude. I think that is true. I also think it is our responsibility to be good stewards of the blessings that have been given to us. I think we might need to work on that.


